



## Auburn Family Shelter

The Auburn Shelter, at 39 Auburn has been a temporary home for homeless families for 36 years.



### Opening of the Brooklyn Hemcoputate Hospital.

The new Brooklyn Homeopathic Hospital was formally opened last evening. The building, which was formerly known as the Cumberland-street Orphan Asylum, is situated on the east side of Cumberland-street, about 130 feet north of Myrtle-avenue. It resembles in appearance a genteel private residence. built of brick, three stories high, and is partly surrounded by pleasant garden grounds. The wards are well arranged and ventilated. and have a capacity sufficient, it is supposed, to meet all demands likely to be made on it. There were about 800 invited guests present at the opening last evening. Prayers were offered in the main hall by Right Rev. Bishop Littlejohn. Then followed a general inspection of the building in all its departments. After partaking of a splendid collation, the company dispersed at a late hour.

### NYC's initiatives for change...

In 2014, under the DeBlasio administration, the city transferred over 400 children and their families out of the shelter, promising to improve services for the 22,000 homeless children in the city.


- Tried to find subsidized/permanent housing or suitable temporary shelter for the families while converting it into an adult family shelter
- Children shared bathrooms with strangers
- Families live in rooms without kitchens or running water,
   preventing them from cooking their own meals or washing baby
   bottles.
- City reported plan to convert part of ground floor, which holds a cafeteria notorious for mice and spoiled food, into a "culinary arts" training program for adult residents.
- The city also added six more microwaves to the cafeteria







